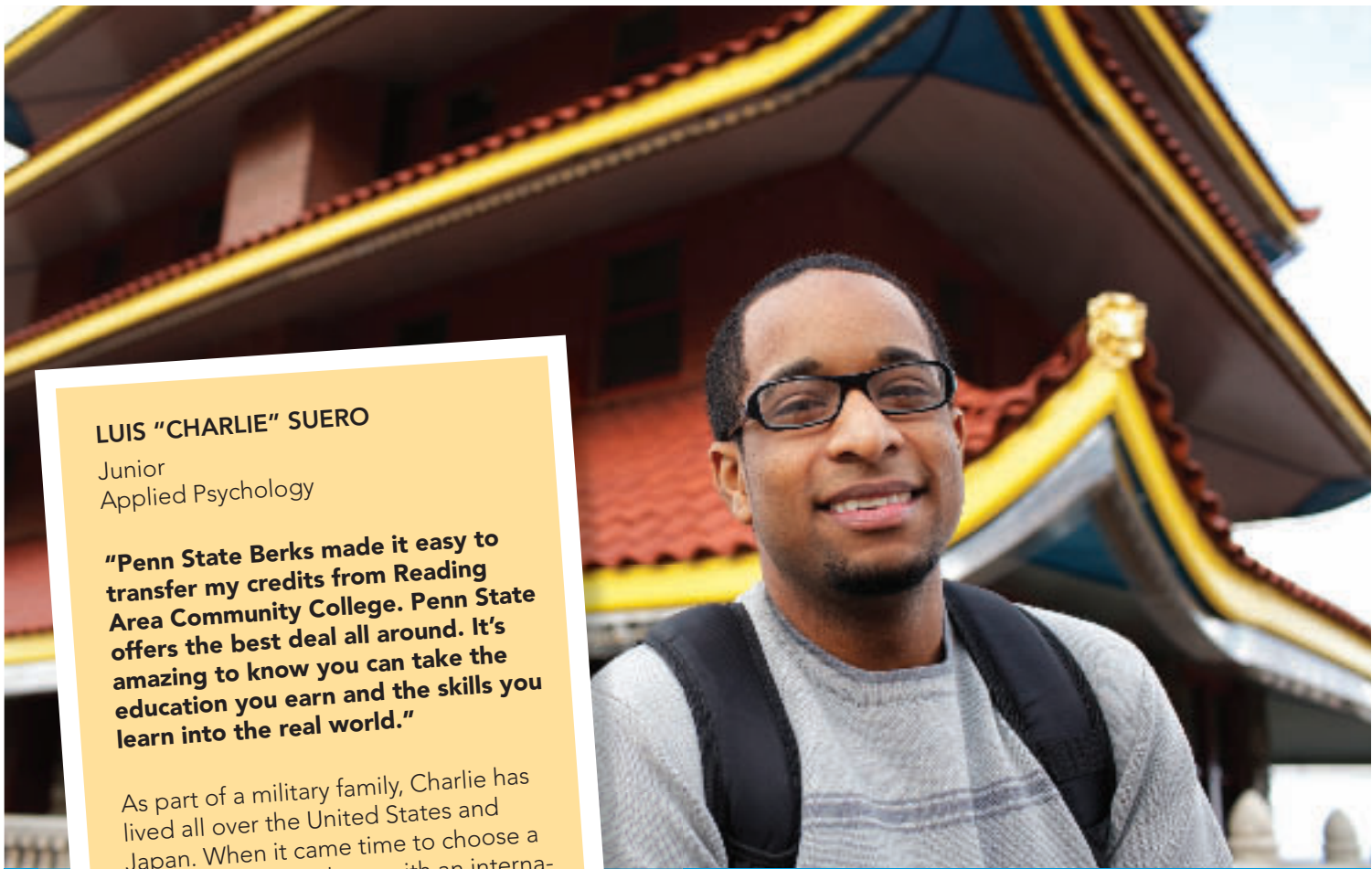

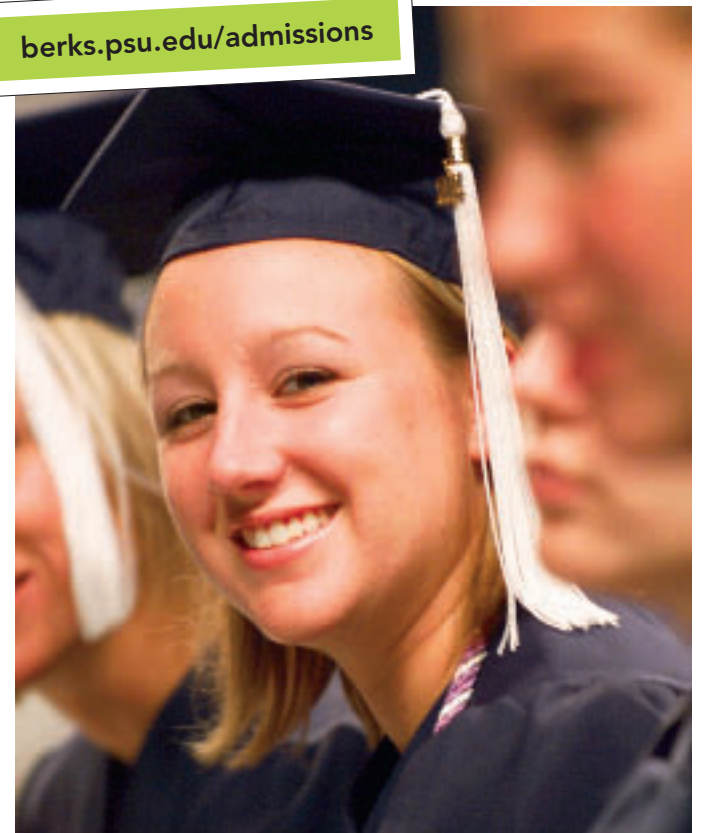

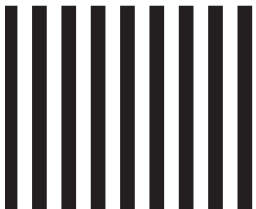

Ike Shibley's enthusiasm for teaching causes a chain reaction in his chemistry classes. Whether he's explaining new concepts from on top of a desk or working side by side with students on research in the lab, his enthusiasm is contagious, making him one of the most popular professors on campus. He has received numerous University-wide awards for teaching and advising and established a national reputation as an expert on teaching. Shibley has a talent for explaining complex subjects in terms that students can understand, but he doesn't rely on a lecture format. Instead, he creates techniques to improve student learning in the classroom, such as using clickers, reading the *New York Times*, and encouraging students to work as a group to solve challenging problems.

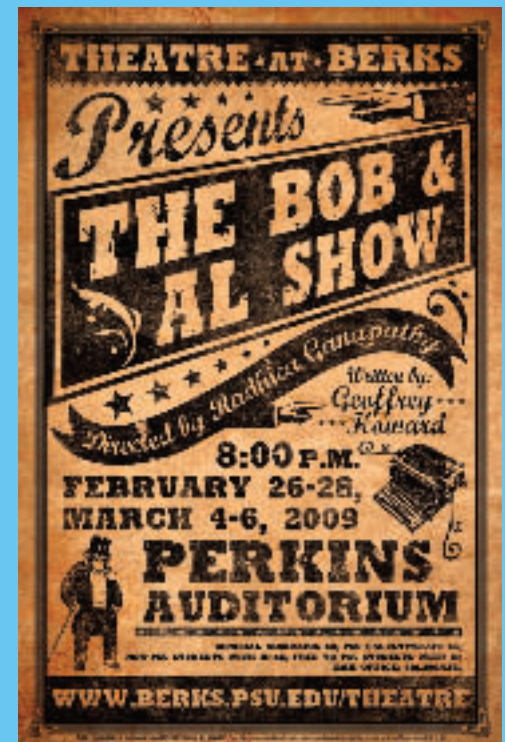

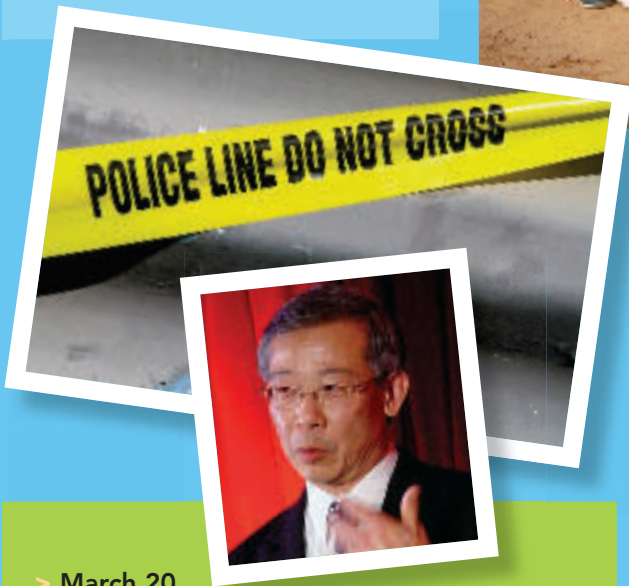
